My dear friends,

One of the features of the Church of Ireland is that it is governed by a Constitution, a relatively short document that is generally quite readable and easily understood. Unlike many Anglican Churches, the Constitution of the Church of Ireland does not only apply to clergy, but applies to all church members, the idea being that we all voluntarily submit to being directed by it when we become church members. That said, I am conscious that most of us have never seen a copy of the Constitution, much less read it. With that in mind, I wanted to draw your attention to a recent addition to the Constitution, entitled 'Dignity in Church Life Charter'.

Church membership implies a commitment to relationship. The gospel invites people into relationship with God and relationship with all who are part of the life of the Church. The pattern of Christian discipleship points to how Christian people are expected to behave in their relationships with one another – church life should be underpinned by respect, valuing everyone's human dignity before God and the pursuit of reconciliation when conflict arises. In this context and in the knowledge that relationships in Church life, as in all life, can be imperfect, the Church has introduced this Charter to ensure Dignity in Church Life for all. In the Charter, the Church commits itself to

- Building and supporting harmonious relationships in church life across its structures;
- Upholding the right of all equally to be treated with dignity and respect;
- Seeking reconciliation where there is disagreement or conflict.

We can all welcome this document. For some years we have had policies in place to look out for the safety of children, but now the Church is tackling the often unseen issues of church life, and the issues that are more frequently faced by adults. No church can be complacent in this regard, nor can any individual. The challenge to each one of us is to honestly assess our own behaviour. We need to ask, are my jokes belittling or demeaning, am I respecting personal space, am I overly tactile or inappropriate in my physical contact with others? There is no licence to do in Church what would not be tolerated in any other sphere of life. In fact, we need to hold ourselves to a higher account, recognising in one another a child of God.

The Dignity in Church Life Charter is available at the back of the Church for anyone who would like to look at it, or it can be found at www.ireland.anglican.org/resources. It contains suggestions for how to deal with conflict, a grievance procedure, advice on reconciliation and a policy on long term clergy illness. I commend it to one and all, and ask for your cooperation in ensuring dignity for all in the life of our parish.
